The Beauty of the Nicene-Constantinople Creed

I have a tendency, and maybe you do as well, to allow some of the most beautiful and best things in life to become ordinary. Being in the presence of our spouse, children, or parents, people we would willingly offer up our lives for can

often become a simple passing of an ordinary moment with no special value. Even something as simple as being able to read and enjoy a book or learn something new becomes as ordinary as white toast (yes without butter).

The Mass, and the parts of the Mass, all too easily become something I just say or do without giving it a thought. Each Sunday at Mass and on special Solemnities (major feast days of the Church) we pray the Nicene-Constantinople Creed (although we often refer to it simply as the Nicene Creed) or the Apostles' Creed, but do we say it with passion? Do we say it as a prayer? Do we stand tall and proud as we proclaim these basic truths of our faith? Do we believe what we are saying?

This Creed that we proclaim is a foundational understanding of our faith as Catholics. It was first established in 325 A.D. at the Council of Nicaea and then expanded in 381 A.D. at the Council of Constantinople. That's, well, a lot of years that Catholics have been praying this Creed.

The Creed addresses key theological issues, such as the divinity of Christ and the nature of the Trinity. The Creed helps us to stay on track when it comes to how we think about, and relate, to God. The Creed reminds us of the great love that God has for us, so great that "for us men and our salvation He came down from Heaven, and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate to the Virgin Mary and became man."

Every Sunday Mass we remind ourselves that you and I are so special and loved by God that He became one of us. Jesus experienced the joys and trials of human life. We remind ourselves in the Creed that His love for us is so great that He even suffered for us! "For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried."

We profess in front of everyone around us that our God is a living God that can even conquer death! Jesus "rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father." Jesus' death was not a failure, in fact, it is quite the opposite. Jesus opened Heaven for us allowing us to share in God's divine life for all eternity.

Jesus, who is love, who died for us, will judge us. So why do we spend so much time judging ourselves and each other? Why do I spend so much of the time as a harsh judge calling myself to task? Why am I trying to take over the role the Father has set aside for Jesus? It is not like I gave myself life, so why do I think I have the authority to judge? After all, "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord the giver of life."

As we all stand together, we proclaim the one faith that Jesus has given us. A faith that has been passed down by Jesus to the Apostles and through their successors the bishops to us. This is how can say with such confidence, "I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come."
